RESEARCH PROJECTS

Expanding Pedagogies of the Home to Sistering within Chicanx/Latinx Immigrant Families, Fall 2019-Ongoing

This research draws draw and expand Chicana feminist theorizations and applications of Pedagogies of the Home, Mother-Daughter Pedagogies, M(other)ing, to explore and acknowledge the various ways mother figures take a central role in nurturing navigational and resistance strategies and supporting the academic success of Latinx students from immigrant families and communities. This project contributes towards a convergent theorization of Pedagogies of Sistering, which acknowledges the various ways in which Latina/Chicana undergraduate mujeres support their siblings, cousins, and extended ties, in accessing and navigating higher education as racialized others within these institutions.

Latina Mujeres Navigating the University and their Experiences with Latina Counterspaces, Summer 2019-Fall 2019

This research explores the experiences of Chicana/Latina mujeres that attended the Latina Connection Conference (LCC) at CSULB, an event that centers the complexity and intersecting identities of Latina mujeres to support their academic, social, and emotional wellbeing as students and beyond their time at the university. This study explores the college transition experiences of Latina mujeres and their experience with the LCC, which functions as a counterspace for Latinas, a culturally affirming environment and community that supports students in navigating between their cultural, home, and school contexts.

Academic Success, Planning, Identity, Retention & Aspirations Realized (ASPIRAR),

Research Team Member, Jan 2018- Present

Project ASPIRAR is a mixed-methods study that aims to understand the navigational processes and transition experiences of Students of Color at UCSD, an emergent Hispanic Serving Institution (HSI). I have been engaged in all aspects of this project, such as developing interview and focus group protocols and survey instruments rooted in a critical review of the literature and data collection that included observations of summer bridge programming, interviews with a diverse group of students, and focus groups. Findings and recommendations from this project are shared with student support services at the university.

Undergraduate Research Opportunities and Student Retention, Graduate Research Assistant **University of California, Irvine,** Nov 2016- Aug 2017

The Office of Undergraduate Research Services (OURS) is a new entity at CSULB aiming to serve as a focal point for all undergraduate research across campus. To understand the needs of the campus regarding undergraduate research, OURS is conducting an institutional needs assessment including student, faculty, staff, and administrative perspectives. The principal investigator of this project is Dr. Angela Locks, director of OURS, and Dr. Elizabeth Nuñez, co-director of the Undergraduate Research Opportunity Program. As part of the research team leading this project, I have conducted literature reviews, completed conceptual framework maps, and developed interview protocol questions. The goal of this work is to develop a plan of action that OURS will implement in promoting undergraduate research opportunities for the broader campus.

Latino Youth Navigating Intersecting Institutions and Contexts in Los Angeles, Research Assistant School of Social Ecology, University of California, Irvine, Sept 2013- June 2014

I contributed to Dr. Maria G. Rendon's longitudinal, qualitative study that explored the experiences of Latino male youth raised in two neighborhoods in Los Angeles. I transcribed bilingual interviews conducted with youth and parents. Also, I analyzed data by coding interviews utilizing Atlas-Ti software and wrote case-specific analytic reports for youth interviews and accompanying parent interviews. The interview data I worked with was part of Dr. Rendon's larger longitudinal study that gained insight into the multiple contexts and spaces youth navigate, including school, neighborhood, and home. In my summer project, I focused on analyzing the educational experiences of the youth by developing case-specific analytic summaries for each youth, with a focus on schooling, and conducted a cross-case analysis of educational trajectories among the Latino male sample.

Emerging Latina Researchers is a Latina and Women of Color centered research community on Instagram that centers the Women of Color researcher experience and engages in research centered discussions for undergraduates, graduate students, faculty, and community members. We host community events and including month-long writing collectives, undergraduate research panel and plática, and an upcoming zine for advocacy centered research and reflections.

I femtor a Latinx undergraduate student who is applying for master's programs in social work throughout California. This involves discussing program options, fit, and funding, along with editing application materials, including personal statements, diversity statements, and CVs. This mentorship program is aimed at supporting senior undergraduates in their graduate school applications.

Femtor for Undergraduate Researchers through Triton Research & Experiential Learning Scholars (TRELS) and Chancellor's Research Excellence Scholarship (CRES),

I have served as a graduate femtor to undergraduate students participating in undergraduate research programs at UCSD. Through this femtorship, I support students in critically analyzing scholarship, learning about critical race theory and Chicana feminist epistemologies, and implement non-traditional

research methodology and methods. I also share critical information regarding research, graduate school opportunities, academia, and research publications.

Graduate Research Assistant- Undergraduate Research Opportunity Program (UROP) California State University, Long Beach, Aug 2016- Aug 2017

The Undergraduate Research Opportunity Program (UROP) provides research opportunities to first and second-year undergraduate students. I developed and presented the curriculum for research seminars, including engaging activities that introduce students to research methodology and research ethics. I supported four undergraduate peer advisors in mentoring our 105 UROP research assistants to ensure our students are supported in their research projects and their transition to college. I also contributed to the development of the Office for Undergraduate Research Services (OURS) at CSULB, a new office that coordinates and serves undergraduate researchers across campus and disciplines.

Program Assistant- Educational Talent Search

California State University, Long Beach, Aug 2014- Aug 2016

Educational Talent Search is a federal TRIO program that supports students attending low resourced high schools by providing support for college preparation and the application process. As the program assistant, I supervised and supported five undergraduate and graduate students who served as college advisors at different high schools in the Los Angeles area with a focus on providing effective college outreach services for students. As a mentor, I advised high school students on study skill techniques, career exploration, financial aid, and college application assistance. I supported the program coordinator in planning, coordinating, and implementing outreach, recruitment, and retention strategies that targeted first-generation college students.

The Latina Connection Conference (LCC) is an annual event at CSULB that invites Latina identified students, staff, faculty, and alumni to engage in a series of workshops, talks, reflections, and activities that center the complexities and intersectionality of the Latina experience. As a facilitator of a familia group, I engage with 10 Latina undergraduates in dialogue and guide the group in the various conference activities. The members of our familia groups maintain femtorship connections beyond the conference.

As a faculty intern for Reading 84, an advanced reading course that meets the general requirements for Long Beach City College students, I monitor student performance to ensure students are on track to be successful in the course and provide additional support to students that need additional resources to do well in the class. Student support involves virtual one on one meetings, group study sessions, and office hours. I also manage the Canvas page for the course.
